

Ten seniors, from different majors and representing four of the eleven Honors Tracks, presented their research and creative projects on Monday, December 1 in the Library Auditorium. In addition, over 100 first year Honors students presented the research they conducted in their Honors 1000 Research Seminars. First Year Honors students present during Honors Research Day

Over 100 first-year students enrolled in Honors 1000 Research Seminar courses gave presentations on Honors Research Day on Monday, December 1st in the UC Ballrooms. Faculty who teach the Honors research seminars introduced the students to college-level research and assisted them with creating their first research presentations related to their specific course section topics. This research is a fundamental part of being in the Honors College at William Paterson University, and experiences like this allow students to feel confident as they prepare to enter into the Honors research or creative track of their choosing. A special thank you to all of the faculty and staff who supported the students through their research.

Navigating Social Identity: Researching Belonging



Taught by:

Dr. Elizabeth Harkins, Professor

Department of Special Education, Professional Counseling, and Disability Studies

This course provided an intensive, interdisciplinary focus on Social Identity Theory (SIT). Students engaged with diverse perspectives to analyze SIT's practical relevance to complex societal issues. The students conducted original research where they applied this theoretical framework to investigate a pressing interdisciplinary issue of their choice.

Ethical Frontiers of AI

Taught by:

Dr. Peter Mandik, Professor

Department of History, Liberal Studies, and Philosophy

In this section, students researched the ethics of artificial intelligence (AI Ethics)—the ethical development and application of AI across all sectors of society and culture. Students investigated AI Ethics through multiple lenses such as philosophy, law, art, music, media studies, education, rehabilitation, sport, and computer science.



Al and Your Career

Department of Sociology and Criminal Justice

Students conducted research on the likely effects of AI on their chosen careers, which included music performance, music education, elementary education, business and forensic psychology.

Civic Literacy as a Core Education Element

Taught by:

Mr. Neil Grimes, Education & Curriculum Materials Librarian, Cheng Library Mr. Gary Marks, Reference & Outreach Librarian, Cheng Library

Student research was broadly focused on the topic of Civic Literacy. Civic Literacy knowledge disparities based on socioeconomic factors or educational experiences were explored in students' projects. Students also investigated social media correlations with civic literacy and civic literacy knowledge among specific student populations like student athletes.



Innovating Health: Carbohydrates



Taught by:

Dr. Nishikant Satam, Professor,

Department of Chemistry

Carbohydrates are the body's main energy source, supporting brain function, speech and language processing, and athletic recovery. Good carbs like whole grains and fruits provide steady energy, while bad carbs such as sugary foods cause crashes and poor health. Choosing

quality carbs helps maintain focus, communication, and performance. These presentations focused on the students' findings about the role of carbohydrates in health and daily function.

Contemporary Global Health Topics in Nursing

Taught by:

Ms. Nancy Weiner, Assistant Director, Access & Information Services, Cheng Library Ms. Linda Salvesen, Systems Librarian, Cheng Library

This seminar explored pressing global health challenges through the lens of nursing practice and examined how nurses navigate complex issues in a rapidly evolving healthcare landscape. Topics included the global nursing shortage, telemedicine, sleep deprivation, cosmetic nursing, pandemic response, and the mental and physical well-being of nursing students and professionals.





All first year Honors students enroll in a section of Honors 1000 during their first semester at William Paterson. This one semester course exposes students to seminar-style learning, and provides them with an opportunity to experience guided research. At the conclusion of the semester, students share their work with the campus community during Honors Research Day.



Research Reflections

Three recent alums who are currently in graduate school at William Paterson served on a "Research Reflections" panel during Honors Research Day. Anna Segelken, '24; Kourtney Scipio, '24; and Diana Zuta,'25, shared how the skills they developed through undergraduate research continue to support their success in graduate school. The panelists also reflected on how their Honors research experiences compare to the expectations of graduate-level research. The session concluded with questions from current Honors students who are interested in preparing for applying to graduate school.

Student Spotlight

Honors senior turns passion into a project

Valentino E. Okanlawon was one of the senior presenters at Honors Research Day on December 1st. A computer science major, Valentino, who is enrolled in the Honors Humanities Track, presented his thesis project, My Staircase Wit, My Esprit d'Escalier. His thesis

involved creating four garments and a belt that reflected his emotions.

During last spring's Honors Research Week, when he was over halfway finished with a sports related thesis project, he found himself to be completely inspired by another student's presentation, and decided to pivot and produce a more creative and memorable thesis. Building on his interest and experience in fashion design, Valentino came up with the idea to complete an Honors thesis project that translated the personal grief that he felt from the loss of a friend, into the intentional design of a four piece capsule in black-washed Japanese Sashiko Denim that reflected human nature, changing seasons, and his own changing mind.

As he sketched the denim pieces, he initially envisioned them in all black, but changed his mind during the creative process to add a wash that he felt mirrored the feelings he had experienced when he attended his friend's funeral; feelings of the grief slowly washing away. Once the sketches were finalized, he went through a rigorous process with the manufacturer, until they were able to accurately capture his vision.

Valentino feels that he owes a lot to the Honors College, especially to Humanities Track Director, Dr. Molly O'Donnell, for her guidance, encouragement, and support, especially after he decided to start over on a completely different thesis topic with only six months to go before graduation.

Valentino said that one of the things he was taught while growing up in a Christian household was that everyone can be a creator

"Regardless of one's religion, I hope everyone sees the value of doing creative work," he said. "Whether your creative work is journaling, podcasting, business ventures, charity work, or having a clothing line like mine, it is so important to keep a healthy ratio of creation vs. consumption."

Valentino is graduating in January 2026 and has ambitious goals for the future that include a corporate job related to IT, continuing to push out new clothing, and developing his own business related to AI.

Faculty Spotlight

Honors 1000 instructor recognized by the State of New Jersey

Congratulations to Neil Grimes, an Honors 1000 Research Seminar professor for five years, who was recognized for his work with the *Real Men Read* program at Willliam Paterson. Grimes, who serves as Education and Curriculum Materials Librarian in the David and Lorraine Cheng Library, was recognized by the State of New Jersey on State Employee Recognition Day earlier this semester.

In his first year at William Paterson University, Professor Grimes started the *Real Men Read* program after being inspired by the program, which originated in the Chicago Public Schools in 2006. William Paterson University is the only university in the country with a *Real Men Read* program, and since its establishment in March of 2020, participants have read to over 6,000 students at preschools and elementary schools that are a part of the College of Education's Professional Development Schools network across Northern New Jersey.

"Literacy research says that boys typically struggle with reading, and that 9 in 10 early childhood and elementary teachers are women, so there's not a lot of men that read to young kids, young boys especially," said Professor Grimes. "This program has a positive effect on the children, but also the

administrators, faculty, staff, and students who participate. It's a powerful experience for our community, especially for our students, to engage in male mentorship and show kids that reading really can be fun."

In 2024, the program received a Library of Congress Literacy Award in the "Emerging Strategies" category, as it serves as a model that other universities

and libraries can adopt to engage in literacy outreach with students as they learn to read and engage in reading.

Congratulations to Professor Grimes for this well-deserved honor and for all your hard work!

Former Honors College student awarded prestigious scholarship

Ruth Basta, a 2023 WP Honors College alum and a current graduate student here at William Paterson was recently awarded the Dr. Maureen Sullivan Foley Memorial Scholarship at the 2025 New Jersey League for Nursing (NJLN) Recognition and Scholarship Awards event. This \$10,000 scholarship will aid her as she pursues her graduate degree. Ruth is currently pursuring a Masters of Science in Nursing in Adult Gerontology Nurse Practitioner in Primary Care. She is one of two Masters of Nursing (MSN) students in New Jersey who received this honor this year. As an undergraduate she completed the Nursing Honors Track, and presented her thesis, *An Exploration of Mindfulness Interventions & Burnout in Bedside Registered Nurses*. She credits her time in the Honors College with helping prepare her for postgraduate studies.

"Completing a research track gave me the skills and experience to feel confident writing literature reviews in the classes that I am currently taking," said Ruth, who also told us that the decision to come back to William Paterson for graduate school was an easy one. "William Paterson is home, and it's been so nice to have classes with professors who taught in my previous classes."

Jordan collects coats annually at her place of employment, Holsten's Brookdale Confectionary in Bloomfield, NJ and is incredibly proud of and grateful for the community there for supporting her mini-coat drive for the last four years.

She began participating in the annual Honors Coat Drive back as a first year student, with her older sister Jessica David, '24 and her friend, Isabel Nemeth, '24 who used to run her own mini-coat drives. It is incredibly inspiring to see how consistent Jordan has been with her participation and how she has kept up with this family tradition.

Bethany Soto, a first year Elementary Education major, was eager to run her own mini-coat drive this year after seeing her older sister do the same during her time in the WP Honors College. She collected coats from her former elementary school she attended when she was a child and was blown away by the outcome.
