

# Liberal Studies Colloquium – LBST 2010

## Prof. Vincent Rama

### Course Overview

Our theme for this course is poverty. We will use the disciplines of economics, medicine, education and ethical theory to evaluate both the causes of poverty and possible remedies. This is a writing-intensive course. By the middle of each week of the course, all students will complete the reading assignment and write an outline of the major position and supporting arguments of the author. After completing the reading and developing the outline, students will write position papers analyzing the author's position on poverty. At the end of the course, each student will produce an eight to nine-page final paper composed of the position papers written earlier in the semester and their own position on poverty.

### Video Discussions

This course includes both weekly online interaction and two scheduled video classes. You will have a choice of 3 different time slots to choose from for each video session. I will try to limit each session to 7 students. Video sessions will last for approximately 90 minutes. See the list of video sessions and possible time slots below:

Attendance at one session for each of the two video discussions is mandatory. Students who cannot attend a video class may complete an additional writing assignment to fulfill this requirement.

### Online Discussions

All other class participation will be online via Blackboard. You will have mid-week and end of week assignment deadlines throughout the course. All assignments and due dates are listed in the Course Map on Blackboard in the Syllabus folder.

### Blackboard

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### Texts and Reading Assignment

- 1) Students are required to complete readings during every week of the course.
- 2) Students are not required to purchase texts for this course.
- 3) All reading assignments can be accessed through the library eBooks collection or through links on the Course Materials page on Blackboard.
- 4) Readings assignments are due mid-week to allow time for the writing of outlines and position papers Deadlines for the readings are posted in the Course Map on Blackboard.

### Assignments

- 1) Participation in two video classes (10%)
  - Students must attend 1 of 3 possible sessions for each of the 2 video classes
  - Students will prepare for and actively participate in the video class discussions (using the outlines they have written for the required reading assignments).
- 2) Weekly Outlines of Required Reading Assignment (10%)
  - Students will develop a one -page outline of both the major position presented in the article and the arguments used by the author to support her or his position.
  - Students will save the outlines to the Journal area on Blackboard.
- 3) Position Papers (30%)
  - Every week students will write a two-page position paper based upon their outline of the major position presented in the required reading and the arguments used by the author to support her or his position.
  - Students will also produce a revision of each position paper based upon feedback from the grading report from Professor Rama.
- 4) Final Paper (50%)
  - 8-9 pages
  - Includes the three two-page position papers written and revised during the semester
  - Add an introduction, a conclusion and one to two pages communicating your position on poverty.
